President's Message

Many exciting things are happening in CANHAVE – we have a lot to celebrate. In my recent visit to Uganda, I had the opportunity to experience this excitement first hand and I was very grateful to do so.

The big news is that the Elizabeth Residence has officially opened and the young women boarders have moved in. The move from the cramped classroom to the spacious new dormitory was accomplished in the blink of an eye! The opening ceremony and the blessing of the building took place on Saturday, April 6, 2013. The guest of honour was His **Eminence Cardinal Emmanuel Wamala** with whom I had the singular honour of cutting the ribbon. In spite of a little rain, the ceremony was enjoyed by all, with the treats made by the Catering students proving to be a great hit. All the invited guests toured the residence and the clip of the opening was in the TV news.



Congratulations go to everyone involved in the new residence.

Last December, the Canadian Board of Directors and the Ugandan Board of Trustees signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). In that MOU the Canadians made the commitment to increase the number of Aids- affected orphans by 10 each year until we support 100 children. This promise caused great joy on part of the Children's Programme Board who quickly identified the new 10 pupils for 2013. As some of our pupils graduated from Primary 7 and Secondary school classes, we now have 27 new-to-CANHAVE pupils who entered mainly at the early Primary levels.

These children were the pupils I spent most of my time visiting, interviewing and speaking with their respective school administrators. Joseph, our Co-ordinator, facilitated the visits and helped me to give out the little gifts we had brought for the children. To see the joy in their faces for these little presents would bring tears to your eyes. It takes so little to help a child feel important and valued.

Their schools are grateful to CANHAVE, appreciative of the school fees being paid readily (often collection of fees is problematic) and supportive of the efforts of our volunteers in Uganda to monitor these children. Slowly but surely, CANHAVE's reputation is growing stronger. We have a solid core of Board members and community volunteers to thank with all our hearts.

I look forward to seeing you at the Annual Meeting on Wednesday, May 29 at 7 pm at Parkwood Presbyterian Church – we have lots of stories to share! See you soon.


Children's Programme Statistics

Leaving a legacy ...

Alexandra Schwabe "Ali"

I began my work with CANHAVE in early 2010, which was my first year at the University of Ottawa. I was initially brought on as a volunteer to redesign the Clarion and gather articles for the spring edition. During this time, I met many of the people who make CANHAVE work and listened to their stories about the children we help. Their reasons for being involved with CANHAVE convinced me that I wanted to continue my work with this charity, and so I joined the board. Since then, I've found my own reasons for staying involved.



CANHAVE is special for so many reasons. It afforded me the unique opportunity to work in a partnership: CANHAVE is a registered charity in both Uganda and Canada. By having a Ugandan board, CANHAVE is in a strong position to assess the needs of the children we seek to support. We can ensure that the funds raised in Canada and sent to Uganda are being used where they are most required. To me, this partnership is CANHAVE's greatest strength.

Another reason I think CANHAVE is special is its focus on education. We aim to give students the tools and skills necessary to become contributing members of Ugandan society, both through the Children's Programme and the Vocational School. Throughout my four years of university, I would stress over tests and papers, about having a heavy workload, and in the midst of exam seasons I could even be found making dramatic proclamations about how much easier my life would be if I wasn't in university. In the middle of essay-writing and studying for midterms, it was easy to forget that I am extremely lucky to be able to study what I want, where I want, in order to start the career I want. Because I worked with CANHAVE, however, I was able to realize and understand just how fortunate I am. See, I had the opportunity to read letters from students we support in Uganda, like this one:

"I am writing to thank you all for the school fees I receive from Canada. I am studying hard to be the best student in my school. I am happy with my school. I thank you, all my donors, for the good things—you help us who cannot help ourselves. Thank you many, many times."

The above is an excerpt from a letter written by George Kakembo a few years ago, when he was a senior at Springfield High School in Kampala, Uganda. To me, his and letters like his were a reminder to spend more time appreciating my education and all the opportunities it will afford me. We need to continue supporting students in Uganda and advocating for education as a right, and those of us who have the opportunity to go to school here in Canada need to treat our educations as a privilege, taking advantage with a smile on our faces.
