Caroline Nakayenga and videographer Dave Depper travelled to Uganda to ensure the container arrived safely. It turned out that Caroline and Dave arrived the same day as the container, February 23rd, 2010. This was an opportunity for them to help at the trade school while capturing the raw emotions of those children that would be directly impacted by the kindness of all the individuals giving to CANHAVE.

The tools not only bring utility, but a sign of hope and the opportunity to improve and be self-supporting. The Lee Valley Tools Initiative was "not about money, it was about helping somebody help themselves". Within the container there were tool kits for the students that they could take after graduating to help them go on to a career of carpentry.



THE MANGO TREE, A LETTER FROM JOESEPH, AND SOME WORDS ON CANHAVE



The mango tree represents reaching out, spirit of giving, and thanking the individuals that contributed to the aid of the Ugandan orphans. It is a way to recognize people who made a significant contribution and allows those in Uganda to have some sense of those in Canada who are interested in helping. Without donors it would have been very difficult to build the trade school and to ensure the children have education necessary advance. The mango tree is the symbol that links the Ugandan orphans and the generous donors. The mangos represent the donors; something natural with the ability to grow.

Joseph Kabali, the Children's Coordinator in Uganda, sent a status report on the last semester of 2009 on December 28th. Report cards are on their way by mail, meanwhile, here is some of the news he sends:

On a sad note we lost one of our committee members on the children's board, Mr. Moses Mutesasira who passed away on 8th September 2009. His death was a blow to all of us in Uganda. May his soul rest in eternal peace.

Six of our children sat for their senior four exams and their names are as follows: Nakabuye Immaculate, Nanono Betty, Nabasumba Agnes, Nabaziwa Erioth, Nabankema Rashida, and Mirembe Abisagi.

CANHAVE is a local non-profit organization that focuses on supporting children by finding exciting and effective ways of making a difference. All of the individuals on the board of directors and volunteers have been dedicated to caring for the students. CANHAVE'S GOALS

Currently, decisions about CANHAVE's projects are made jointly by the Ugandan and Canadian boards. The strong bridge between the Ottawa and Ugandan communities allows CANHAVE to focus on initiatives that will make the biggest impact on the children.

- Acquire major grants from large institutions
- Establish adequate wiring to have electricity
- Build a female dormitory
- Build a security wall with gate
- Currently CANHAVE helps 60 children; eventually increase to 100
- Employ excellent teachers and provide them with proper housing

The Trade School







CANHAVE made an honourable decision when the organization decided to help the orphan children in Uganda. It was one thing to help sponsor the children to go to their local schools, but what were they to do after they accomplished the highest level of what would be equivalent to high school?

The students reached out to CANHAVE; "We are so thankful you (CANHAVE) have supported us, but to earn a living we need to be trained in a skill that is marketable". The trade school has been an ongoing initiative. With the invaluable help from donors and volunteers CANHAVE is working towards teaching the students a trade that will ensure they become more self-supporting. The trade school focuses on teaching the students farming, sewing, carpentry, and catering. The next stage of the trade school would be to teach the students computing, but first there must be funding towards adequate computers having electricity and throughout the school.

When children learn that others their own age are not always given the same opportunities, they sometimes take it upon themselves to make a difference. This is a special kind of giving that CANHAVE supports, as it gives children here learning and growing opportunities, encourages strong values of helping others, and it benefits those in Uganda.


Furthermore, receiving help from others encourages the CANHAVE students in Uganda to help as well. One young student, named Peter, was 16 when Board member Gwynneth Evans visited in 2003. At the time he was not sure what he was going to do with his life. When she revisited him in 2009 he said, "I'm ready to give back" and he now teaches carpentry at the Trade School.

Another example of child to child giving is Olivia Ewing-Dolbec and her gift to CANHAVE. Olivia and her mother Janine began a project called Children's Cards for Charity in 2006. Every year they decide on a theme for greeting cards. This year they chose CANHAVE as their charity of choice, with the theme "Our Blessings" for the cards. Children from the Rideau Park United Church Sunday School were invited to use their creative talents and imagination to make cards while also learning about the different challenges that families in Africa can face. The project was an opportunity for the students to learn about the world around them and the importance of giving, while also giving them a concrete way to make a difference.
